Are You A Child Of God?

In the generic sense, all human beings "are the offspring of God" (Acts 17:29) because we are made "in the image of God" (Genesis 1:27). But I am asking if you are a child of God in the specific sense of having been born again of water and the Spirit (John 3:3, 5). That is to say, have you believed the gospel and been baptized (Mark 16:16)? If you have, then you are a child of God.

As I have talked to people about their relationship with God, several have told me what fine Christians their parents were, or that "my wife (or husband, as the case may be) is a faithful member of the church." While I rejoice if such is, indeed, the case, your parents' relationship with God makes you neither more nor less pleasing to Him. The same is true of your spouse; you can't go to Heaven in your spouse's coat pocket!

Someone astutely observed that God has no grandchildren. If your parents were children of God, that's great! But it doesn't make you God's grandchild and thereby secure your salvation. We might add that God has no sons-in-law or daughters-in-law, either. If your spouse is a child of God, you are blessed in numerous ways; but that doesn't make you God's son-in-law or daughter-in-law, eligible to receive eternal life without believing and obeying the gospel.

Let me ask again: Are you a child of God? To as many as received Jesus "He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name: who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of man, but of God" (John 1:12, 13).

Receiving Jesus, then, is not reciting a prayer or "asking Jesus to come into your heart." It is believing in Him and being spiritually reborn through baptism into

Christ. In baptism, one dies to sin and comes forth to live in newness of life (Romans 6:4)

As children grow and develop after they are born, so God's spiritual children must strive to become more and more like Jesus. The apostle John specifies two major areas upon which we are to focus: "In this the children of God and the children of the devil are manifest: Whoever does not practice righteousness is not of God, nor is he who does not love his brother" (1 John 3:10).

Children of God, then, must practice righteousness (i.e. obey God's word), and they must love each other.

Can you imagine a time when people from other nations cross over your borders and do unimaginable things to you and your family?

Can you imagine public bathrooms where all manner of lewd and lascivious activities take place?
