

# Human Suffering And God's Wrath

Atheists claim that human suffering proves there is no God. On the other extreme, some who believe in God assert that human suffering is always the result of God's wrath upon the one who is suffering. Truth, as we might expect, lies between the extremes.

Before sin occurred in Eden, there was no sickness, no pain, no hurricanes, no fires, no death. Beyond dispute, God allows such things to be commonplace now because of sin. That is not to say, however, that every episode of suffering is due to divine wrath against the sufferer!

Much of the misunderstanding stems from the false doctrine of inherited sin. I have engaged in discussions with people who believed little babies are born guilty of Adam's sin, and therefore God afflicts them with terrible diseases! But God Himself told Ezekiel that *"the son shall not bear the guilt of the father"* (18:20). God's own law given to Israel through Moses forbade punishing children for the crimes of parents (Deuteronomy 24:16).

Job's friends foolishly assumed his suffering was God's way of punishing him for his sins. The Twelve likewise presumed that a man's blindness from birth might be due to his parents' sin (John 9:2). The Lord corrected all of them.

Everyone has known of cases where the innocent suffer due to the sins of the guilty. Drunk drivers kill the innocent and walk away unscathed. Drug-addicted parents spend money on drugs while innocent children go without food and clothes.

Yes, suffering characterizes the world because of sin. But that does not mean every case of suffering is due to God's wrath against the sufferer.

# WE, LIKE SHEEP

As I was on my bus route one day I saw a flock of sheep in a field. In a corner next to the fence, I noticed several sheep grouped together. There, tangled up in the fencing, was a little black lamb. A man, the shepherd I suppose, was walking on the other side of the fence toward the sheep, on his way to rescue the poor little lamb.

and gently lead those that are with young" (Isaiah 40:11).
