Businesses may take inventory at the first of the year for tax purposes or to see if the company was profitable last year. What about you and me? How did we do last year? What adjustments do we need to make? Several matters call for an inventory:

- 2. Prayer. "You do not have because you do not ask" (James 4:3). "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). Need we say more?
- 3. Attendance. Satan has used the pandemic to condition us into thinking in-person attendance is a mere option. For the truly ill, watching the service on an electronic device is helpful. I know that by experience! Nevertheless, when healthy, active people simply choose not to show up, Scripture calls it sin (Hebrews 10:26). Lame excuses, justifications, and rationalizations will never solve this!
- 4. Giving. God doesn't "need" anything from us (Acts 17:25). Giving has always been an indication of love for God. The poorest Jew under the Law gave ten percent of his gross income (not what was left after paying the bills). Most Jews gave a good deal more. Under the New Covenant we are to give as God has prospered us (1 Corinthians 16:2). How would your income be affected if God prospered you in proportion to the generosity of your giving?
- 5. Good works. You can name dozens of bad things you haven't done. That's great? Now, what good works have you done? That's one purpose God has for you in Christ (Ephesians 2:10).

Don't Believe It - Believe Him!

Many and varied are the deceptive messages of the world around us. Sometimes the voices are so blatantly false as to hardly escape the attention of any objectively-minded seeker of truth. Even then, we are reminded of the old adage that says, "If you say something loud enough and often enough, people will believe it." Isaiah decried the twisted values of his day, saying, "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil; who substitute darkness for light and light for darkness; who substitute bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter?" (Isaiah 5:20). We are similarly shocked by the audacity of some who boldly perpetuate such lies among the unsuspecting of our day.

However, most of the deception in the world exists in the form of subtle, gradual departures from the truth, often unnoticed until the passing of time draws its stark contrast between things accepted today which were once rejected as immoral and ungodly. Discernment is in short supply these days because we lack training in God's word (Hebrews 4:14). Consequently, we have become desensitized to evil and led in the direction of outright repudiation of moral and spiritual truth. Our moral compass has been corrupted and we are spinning out of control.

Jesus is the answer. He is "the way, the truth, and the life..." (John 14:6). If we come to "know the truth," "the truth will set us free" (John 8:32). If we would be rescued from darkness, we must "practice "the truth" and "come to the Light" (John 3:21). Jesus is "the Light of the world" and His "word is truth" (John 8:12; 17:17). Truth hardly registers in a world dominated by "the father of lies" (John 8:44). But, when we encounter his message, we must not believe it; but, instead, we must hold to the One who is the embodiment of truth and believe Him (Ephesians 4:21).
