Weebles Wobble, But They Don't Fall Down

"Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall" (I Corinthians 10:12, ESV).

I saw a post, recently, with a picture of Weebles and the caption, "Weebles' wobble but they don't fall down."

Weebles are children's egg-shaped roly-poly toys rounded at the bottom. The object is to push on them but instead of toppling over they will upright themselves again. Christians should be like Weebles and bounce back again when we get knocked down, or when we fall.

Even the strongest of Christians will sometimes fall. It could be from self-weakness. It could be from being pushed by someone. Either way, we should not stay down. Rather we should bounce back up again.

We're not built on a rounded foundation so a bounce back, or rebound, is not automatic. It takes effort and help. We can, and hopefully we do, receive help from our fellow Christians. James says, "My brothers, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and someone brings him back, let him know that whoever brings back a sinner from his wandering will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins" (James 5:19-20).

We must make every effort to upright ourselves. We can do that by looking to Jesus and following His

example and teachings, making every effort to do His will, not our own. We must recognize, as did Paul, the issue of the battle between the fleshly self and the spiritual self (Romans 7:15-20). His solution is to serve the will of God, not the fleshly desires (Romans 7:24-25).

John assures us that by walking in the light our sins will be forgiven if we confess them (I John 1). We will sin. We will fall down. But we must not stay down. We must be a Weeble Christian and bounce back, refusing to stay down.
