Too Busy

Well over a century ago, J.W. McGarvey commented on the parable of the sower (Matthew 13; Mark 4; Luke 8). Regarding the thorn-infested soil, which Jesus said represented the heart where God's word was choked out by "the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches," McGarvey observed: "These today outnumber all other classes, and perhaps they have always done so."

I concur with brother McGarvey's view. Jesus said the wayside soil represented people who don't understand the word when they hear it. No doubt there are a few of these, and none of us has perfect understanding. But the vast majority who hear the pure word of God understand what He requires of them.

Those who fall away due to persecution Jesus described as rocky soil, where the seed cannot establish roots. Here again, persecution may drive a few away even today, but we are blessed to live in a time and place of relative peace in that regard.

By far the greatest hurdle we face is that third category: the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches. A thousand and one activities compete with the Lord for our time, attention, and resources. Most of them are good things. That is, they are not immoral or inherently sinful. Nevertheless, unless we are careful, we may allow these otherwise "good" things to crowd out the essential things.

The same can happen with making money. We take on more and more commitments, striving for that higher standard of living, that newer car, that larger house, that extra gadget that we suppose will make life

more enjoyable. But how does all of this affect our relationship with God?

Do you find yourself so "busy" that you don't have time to read the Bible? to pray? to assemble with the saints regularly? to be an active participant in the work of the church? It isn't really that we don't have time. There are always 24 hours in a day. We simply choose to budget our time differently. We put other things ahead of the Lord. We allow the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches to choke the word of God right out of our lives!

J.W. McGarvey recognized this problem over 100 years ago, when life was far slower-paced than it is now. Certainly we, in our hectic lives, would be wise to exercise great caution, lest we strangle God's word with things that might otherwise be wholesome and good. "Let the one who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall" 1 Corinthians 10:12).
