The Invitation

We customarily offer an invitation toward the close of each meeting. Anyone who wishes to obey the gospel, or to confess sin and be restored, or to receive help with some other spiritual need, is invited to come to the front while an appropriate song is sung. Those responding are then assisted as the situation calls for.

While this invitation is a tradition that is not mandated in Scripture, it is entirely in harmony with God's word. Certainly we ought to urge people to believe and obey the gospel: "Knowing, therefore, the terror of the Lord, we persuade men" (2 Corinthians 6:2). One way we may encourage prompt response to the word of God is by singing. In fact, one of the stated purposes for singing in the New Testament is to "admonish (warn) one another" (Ephesians 5:19).

One of the drawbacks to having this traditional invitation is that we may grow so accustomed to it that we think folks can respond to the gospel *only* when an invitation is extended at the close of a meeting. I hope all of us realize that the Lord's invitation is *always* open! We have rejoiced to see people baptized on Monday afternoon, Friday evening, and other times throughout the week. It is always right to believe and obey God without delay, regardless of the day or hour. In fact, in the New Testament examples of conversion to Christ, not one person ever ate a bite, drank a drop, or slept a wink from the time he understood the gospel until he obeyed it. The Ethiopian eunuch didn't wait for a meeting of the church or a formal invitation – he was immersed out in the middle of nowhere, with no other mortal to see it except Philip (who immersed him), and perhaps the chariot driver (Acts 8). The Philippian jailer and his household were immersed in the wee hours of the

morning; and Lydia and her household were immersed in a river on a Saturday (Acts 16).

Have you been thinking about obeying the gospel? Or have you already been baptized, but have strayed away and want to return to the Lord? Have you delayed because you're embarrassed to respond during the invitation song? Please realize that you can become right with God without coming to the front of the auditorium at the close of an assembly. If you need to be immersed, contact me, one of the elders, or any other member of the congregation; we'll make every effort to meet this need without delay. If you need to be restored, this, too, can be handled privately and then announced to the church.

Offering an invitation and singing an invitation song toward the close of each meeting is a good tradition. Let us not detract from it by acting as though it is the only possible time for an acceptable response to God and His word!

WHAT LURES YOU?

Something that has a small attraction for us but not enough that we succumb to it. Ah, but today Satan has added a little "crappie nibble," that icing to the cake.

And before we know what has happened, Satan has us hooked and is reeling us in. Now we are his.

Yes, he is cunning, and takes advantage, thus we must not be ignorant of his schemes (II Corinthians 2:11). He disguises himself as an angel of light (II Corinthians 11:14).
