BELIEVE IT!

Paul preached Christ at the Synagogue in Antioch of Pisidia (Acts 13:14). As he concluded, he warned the Jews not to be like their ancestors, to whom God had said: "Behold, you despisers, Marvel and perish; For I will work a work in your days, a work which you will by no means believe, though one were to declare it to you" (Acts 13:41, quoting Habakkuk 1:5).

How do a 7th-century BC prophet's words apply to people in the first (or twenty-first) century? Both Paul and Habakkuk spoke words from God that their people found hard to swallow. In both cases, failure to believe and obey God would result in disaster. Habakkuk and his people were facing destruction and captivity at the hands of the Chaldeans; the prophet himself could scarcely believe it, and the people scoffed. In only a few short years, however, here came Nebuchadnezzar, Do you suppose they were still scoffing? Ten years later, he came again. After still ten more years, he appeared once more, this time utterly destroying Jerusalem, slaughtering the vast majority of its population, and taking most of the survivors as captives. God's people had failed to heed Habakkuk's warning; they had only themselves to blame.

Paul told the Jews in Antioch a message they found hard to swallow: you can't be saved by the Law of Moses, but Jesus is the promised Messiah Who was crucified and raised from the dead, and you can be saved through Him. Unfortunately, most of Paul's Jewish audience despised his message, just as Habakkuk's people had done. They contradicted and blasphemed, and finally stirred up such opposition that Paul & Barnabas were expelled from the region (Acts 13:45, 50). How sad, that they didn't heed the warning or learn from the mistakes of their ancestors! Do you ever find God's word difficult to swallow? "Enter by the narrow gate . . . which leads to life . . .there are few who find it" (Matthew 7:13, 14). Isn't that awfully negative and exclusive? "There is no other name (than Jesus) under heaven, given among men, by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

How can we say this in an age of tolerance and non-judgmentalism? Then we read: Jesus will return "in flaming fire, taking vengeance on those who do not know God, and on those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thessalonians 1:8). Is this just too much to swallow? Remember this: God has proven Himself repeatedly. He is right, but seldom (if ever) does the majority of the world agree with Him.

Let us not repeat the mistake of Habakkuk's people and the Jews in Antioch by rejecting God's word because we think it's too much to swallow.

What we need is to restore our focus upon that great people called the Assembly of Separated Ones who are the exclusive Carriers of Good News.
