Being Confrontational

Most of us avoid confrontations. In some ways, that's good. Scripture admonishes us not to be spoiling for a fight like someone who "is proud, knowing nothing, but is obsessed with disputes and arguments over words, from which come envy, strife, reviling, evil suspicions, useless wranglings . . ." (1 Timothy 6:4, 5a).

The time comes, however, when faithfulness demands that we confront people with the reality of sin and salvation – even if their reaction is likely to be negative. Peter, for example, spoke to a crowd at the Jerusalem temple about "Jesus, whom you delivered up and denied in the presence of Pilate . . . you denied the Holy one and the Just, and asked for a murderer to be granted to you, and killed the Prince of life, whom God raised from the dead" (Acts 13:13, 14). Within a couple of hours, the Sanhedrin arrested him and John. The worldly-wise might say, "Peter, you were too negative! They were offended, and it's your fault!" Fortunately, Peter didn't listen to worldly wisdom; he was inspired by the Spirit of God.

At their trial the next day, Peter addressed the Sanhedrin this way: "... by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by Him this [formerly lame] man stands here before you whole. This is the 'stone which was rejected by you builders, which has become the chief cornerstone.' Nor is there salvation in any other ..." (Acts 4:10-12). Today, Peter might be sent to sensitivity training! The Council let them go with strict orders to speak no more in Jesus' name.

After praying with the church, the apostles kept right on teaching the same message. Arresting them again, the Sanhedrin indignantly asked, "Did we not

strictly command you not to teach in this name? And look, you have filled Jerusalem with your doctrine, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us!" (Acts 5:28). This very council had condemned Jesus to death, but they didn't want to own up to it. Peter simply affirmed again: "The God of our fathers raised up Jesus whom you murdered by hanging on a tree" (5:30). That makes three times that he confronted them with their sin of crucifying Jesus, and with the fact of His resurrection (which was especially offensive to the Sadducees on the court).

Jesus said that the Spirit would, among other things, "convict the world of sin" (John 16:8). Since the Spirit operates through His word, we must faithfully teach His word so that people will be convicted of sin. We need not be rude or crude, but we must confront!

THIS REALLY HAPPENED
