It's no secret what usually happens when such a dilemma arises. Jesus states in Matthew 16:24 that His disciples "must deny themselves," but sadly, most deny Jesus. For far too many, true discipleship is the exception and not the norm. I can only imagine how it would be if things changed and more would see the importance of serving Jesus at this level.

What would be the end result? Only heaven knows.
