No, God hasn't given us H2O that will restore our youth. He has given us something infinitely better: spiritual life in Christ here and now, and the confident hope of living with Him and all the redeemed of all ages in Heaven forever.

1. The answer to this question is so important in the 'hand-out' culture in which we live. If God just randomly chooses a person for great things, then that gives us an excuse not to do great things for Him

because "He hasn't selected me." This would mean that God's sovereignty is really favoritism at its worst; it lets us shrink back into His spiritual welfare system waiting for our next scrap.

But God has always been about our individual responsibility. Yes, He did the work of salvation through His Son on the cross; but we are to believe, obey, love, forgive, serve, and go – among other acts of obedience. These are actions that require us to stand up from our spiritual couches, brush the crumbs off our laps, and roll up our sleeves.
