Paul confesses that he was once "a blasphemer, a persecutor, and violent" (1 Timothy 1:13), and Peter even denied knowing Jesus three times.

God's word is not a written record of perfect people, and He holds back nothing. Intricate details of sin are often painstakingly revealed. Some may ask, "Why?" We must first realize that God is not "airing out dirty laundry." By including these events, God allows His people to see that errors can be overcome. Second, it provides hope to those who fall prey to the same situations. Last, it helps people to realize that mercy and forgiveness is obtainable (John 21:15 - 17).

God's Will And Our Choice

Although Christ is an absolute monarch, He is no tyrant because He conquers no one against that person's will. It is utterly impossible to bring men under the power of Christ without changing their mind, their understanding, and their will. These very important changes take place through instruction in the gospel of Christ, which is the power of God unto salvation.

It is not the aim of Christianity to govern men forcibly and externally. Christ governs through voluntary surrender to the will of God. Men must come to realize that God's rule of law is best. Men are not wise enough to rule themselves.

Every human government must be either pragmatic or tyrannical. It must either change as the people change and, in doing so, reflect their values and wishes; or else it must rule with the iron hand of a human despot.

Christianity does neither! Christianity can never be pragmatic because it regards truth as co-existent with God and, therefore, unchangeable. However, Christianity is no more compatible with the spirit of tyranny than of pragmatism. The will of Christ cannot be enforced by carnal means. One is never brought into the kingdom of Christ by coercion.

Even if Christians were in the majority, and if they could enforce their convictions by the sheer weight of their numbers, it would not be right to do so. Christ never intended for His followers to throw their weight around. Since the Lord does not force His will upon anyone, He does not grant His disciples that right either.
