Unthankfulness keeps some quite unsavory company!

Christians, of all people, ought to be characterized by thankfulness. We have even more reason than the psalmist to exclaim, "what shall I render to the Lord for all His benefits toward me?" (Psalm 116:12). Gratitude isn't a debt that can be paid, but we certainly can and should express our thanks and praise.

The Power of Example

Who is watching me? All Christians should consider this question and realize that the appearance and perception we project to others is of vital importance. In 1 Peter 2:11-12, the apostle says, "Beloved, I beg you as sojourners and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul, having your conduct honorable among the Gentiles (unbelievers), that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may, by your good works which they observe, glorify God in the day of visitation."

It almost goes without saying that Christians must resist temptation and fight against sinful desires. In verse 11, Peter is saying, in effect, "Don't act like everyone else." Rather we are to conduct ourselves in such a manner that unbelievers will take notice. Described as "good works" in verse 12, then in the following text, Peter describes at least six ways in which our example can influence others so that they will give God the honor and glory He deserves.

- Be Good Law-abiding Citizens (2:13-16)
- Honor and Respect Those in Authority (2:17)
- Be Good Employees and Employers (2:18-20)
- Live an Exemplary Christian Family Lifestyle (3:1-7)
- Practice Unparalleled Unity within the Church (3:8-12)
- Follow the Example of Christ (3:18-22; 4:1-2)

Finally, the power of our example must be based on supreme love. "And above all things have fervent love for one another, for love will cover a multitude of sins" (4:8)
