Biblical faith does <u>not</u> contradict sound reasoning! Biblical faith does <u>not</u> mean we jettison observable truth! Biblical faith is <u>not</u> blind, but is based on evidence – evidence from God's **word** which is perfectly compatible with evidence from God's **world**.

Atheistic dogma that rejects proven facts is **<u>not</u>** faith. So, let's not denigrate faith by calling it that!

Can We Really Be Like Jesus?

When thinking about the earthy life of Jesus Christ, it is nothing short of extraordinary. From His humble birth in a manger, to His ministry to the multitudes, we are fascinated by His composure, compassion and character.
