When King Saul failed to obey the voice of the Lord, Samuel explained the significance of his disobedience, saying, "Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed than the fat of rams" (1 Samuel 15:22). A lifetime of worshipping God means nothing without a daily walk in obedience to His will. Hebrews 5:9 tells us that Jesus became to "all those who obey Him the source of eternal salvation." If we would truly please God, we must learn and practice obedience from the heart.
